Trees are made into paper products including newspapers, magazines and cardboard

Pulp is filtered out of the water into 'sludge' which is turned into agricultural fertiliser



Sewer pipes transport the waste to a water treatment plant

The waste & pulverised pulp is flushed into the normal sewerage system





Used medical pulp is disposed of in a **pulp macerator** and pulverised into tiny particles

The single-use items and their contents are disposed of via a pulp macerator, meaning there is no further clinician or patient interaction with potentially infectious waste and its container.
